A NOTE ABOUT WORSHIP

We believe that Jesus is the Savior of all. By his life, death, and resurrection Jesus saves all sinners simply because he loves us. That is called the gospel, and it's the good news on every page of God's Word. Therefore, the Bible is not just information about God or rules from God, but the saving power God uses to create and strengthen faith in our hearts and restore our lives. Lutheran worship places this good news at the center of the worship service with an order called *liturgy*. In both the Word and sacrament (Means of Grace), in specifically selected Scripture readings, and in carefully crafted and often ancient songs, prayers, and creeds, the liturgy proclaims the good news of Jesus from start to finish.

Lutheran worship is also designed to include the participation of the entire assembly (including children). For your ease and convenience, the order of service is printed out entirely. If a song is not found in this service folder, it can be found in the red hymnal located in front of you. Parts marked L are spoken or sung by the worship leader, and the parts marked c and printed in bold are spoken or sung by the congregation.



ORDER OF SERVICE

PASTOR'S WELCOME

Please stand.

A Gathering Rite is a memorable way of putting together song with confession and absolution. Often it also heightens awareness on the theme for the day or the season of the Church Year. This Gathering Rite focuses our faith where it needs to be in preparation for Holy Week.

This hymn was written by German lawyer, Johann Franck, in the late 1640s. A WELS church band, Koine, gave it a new melody and setting in 2014 for use as a gathering hymn for confession and absolution.

GATHERING RITE

Lord, to You I Make Confession

- In the name of the Father, and of the Son ♣ and of the Holy Spirit.
- C (spoken) Amen.
- (sung) We have come into God's presence, Maker of the heavens and earth. He created us to love him; to serve him as his precious child. We have disobeyed and errored, thus deserving wrath and anger.
- Therefore, let us confess our sins to him and plead for his mercy.



"Whoever conceals their sins does not prosper, but the one who confesses and renounces them finds mercy."



Psalms have been used in worship since the Old Testament.

The Lord's help and protection lead us to eternal blessings.

PSALM OF THE DAY

- c he does whatever pleases him.
- L ⁹ All you Israelites, trust in the Lord—

Using the picture of a priest and the example of Mechizedek (Genesis 14), this section points us to Jesus' obedience that provides eternal salvation for us.

SECOND READING Hebrews 5:7-10

⁷ During the days of Jesus' life on earth, he offered up prayers and petitions with fervent cries and tears to the one who could save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. ⁸ Son though he was, he learned obedience from what he suffered ⁹ and, once made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him ¹⁰ and was designated by God to be high priest in the order of Melchizedek.

Even though there is both glory and humiliation in this life, Jesus brings an eternal life that draws us away from the world to his home in heaven.

GOSPEL **John 12:20-33**

²⁰ Now there were some Greeks among those who went up to worship at the festival. ²¹ They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, with a request. "Sir," they said, "we would like to see Jesus." ²² Philip went to tell Andrew; Andrew and Philip in turn told Jesus.

²³ Jesus replied, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. ²⁴ Very truly I tell you, unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds. ²⁵ Anyone who loves their life will lose it, while anyone who hates their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. ²⁶ Whoever serves me must follow me; and where I am, my servant also will be. My Father will honor the one who serves me.

²⁷ "Now my soul is troubled, and what shall I say? 'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it was for this very reason I came to this hour. ²⁸ Father, glorify your name!"

Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and will glorify it again." ²⁹ The crowd that was there and heard it said it had thundered; others said an angel had spoken to him.

³⁰ Jesus said, "This voice was for your benefit, not mine. ³¹ Now is the time for judgment on this world; now the prince of this world will be driven out. ³² And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." ³³ He said this to show the kind of death he was going to die.

SERMON John 12:20-33

Doing Away with the Distractions

NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation, he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary, and became fully human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate. He suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who in unity with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy Christian and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the

dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

A creed is a statement of faith. Creed comes from the Latin "credo," which means "believe." Together, we are professing and proclaiming the biblical faith in our triune God as Lord and Savior.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever and ever. Amen.

In the service that Martin Luther adapted, called **Deutche Messe** (1526), to incorporate more congregational participation, he included this to emphasize ongoing instruction in biblical teaching for all Christians, especially for communicants.

ADMONITION OF COMMUNICANTS

I admonish you in Christ that you look upon the Sacrament of Christ in true faith, above all having confident assurance in your hearts in the words by which Christ grants his body and blood for the forgiveness of sins. That you remember and give thanks for his boundless love of which he gave proof when he redeemed us by his blood from God's wrath, sin, death, and hell, and thereupon take to yourselves externally the bread and wine, that is, his body and blood, as your guarantee and pledge. In his name, therefore, and according to his command, let us proceed, by the use of his own words, to the use and administration of the Sacrament.



THE SACRAMENT

WORDS OF INSTITUTION



Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night he was betrayed, took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat; this is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Then he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me."

PREFACE

- L The Lord be with you.
- C And also with you.
- L Lift up your hearts.
- C We lift them up to the Lord.
- Let us give thanks to the Lord, our God.
- C It is good and right so to do.
- It is truly good and right that we should at all times and in all places give you thanks, almighty Father, through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who humbled himself to take the punishment our sins deserve so that we would be free from guilt forever. Therefore, with all the saints on earth and hosts of heaven, we praise your holy name and join their glorious song:

The Preface is one of the most ancient parts of the historic liturgy of the Christian church, dating to the Second century, or before.





Recorded for us in Isaiah 6:4, angels sing, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord Almighty," in the presence of the Triune God. The Church sings the same song in preparation for His Supper, faithfully confessing the Lord's true presence in the Sacrament.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE SACRAMENT



God tells us in the Bible that his Supper is for sinners who are accurately instructed in his word, who examine themselves by living in repentance, and who recognize the miraculous real presence of Jesus' body and blood. It is our joy and honor to trust God's Holy Word. Therefore, we ask that only current WELS/ELS members come forward to receive the Sacrament at the direction of the ushers. If you have questions, please speak with Pastor before taking part in the sacrament. He welcomes the chance to study what God says with you. And thanks so much for honoring God's Word in this manner.

This familiar prayer was written by Luther for use following the distribution of the sacrament.

We give you thanks, almighty God, that you have refreshed us with the saving gift. We pray that through it you will strengthen our faith in you and increase our love for one another. We ask this in the name of Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

C Amen.

Luther directed the clergy to use these words of blessing which God gave Old Testament priests to speak over his people of Israel.
